Additionally, HBKU's Executive Education Center delivers customized programs for the business community in Qatar and the region.


Why Study at HBKU?

College Overview

Founded in 2015, HBKU's College of Law is a graduate-level law school located in Qatar Foundation's Education City. The College of Law offers four degrees: Juris Doctor (J.D.), Master of Laws (LL.M.) in International Economic and Business Law, Master of Laws (LL.M.) in International Law and Foreign Affairs, and Doctor of Juridical Science (S.J.D.)

HBKU's College of Law provides its students with professional legal skills to bolster the sectors vital to Qatar, the region, and the world. These sectors are many and include the most dynamic aspects of a society such as construction, courts, energy, environment, finance, healthcare, infrastructure, international investment and trade, media, sports, and technology (including intellectual property).

Four qualities distinguish learning across the College of Law's four academic programs:

- ▶ The curriculum balances theory with practical application. Each course integrates aspects from the profession, industry, government, and society sectors which the college is dedicated to serving.
- ▶ Courses have a strong international and comparative law focus. College of Law faculty members, who come from around the world, teach by using the disciplines needed to understand the three diverse legal systems—civil, common, and Shari'a—that inform Qatari law.

- ▶ Education occurs extensively outside of the classroom as students learn from leading legal academics from around the world, practicing lawyers, and government officials.
- ▶ Driving all aspects of the educational experience is the steady volume of high-level, societally relevant research produced by the faculty and students, which addresses contemporary problems in law and related disciplines. Students in the LL.M. and S.J.D. programs write a high-quality thesis or dissertation under the guidance of a faculty supervisor.

College of Law students have abundant career prospects in Qatar and globally. The college encourages students to participate in internship programs and moot court competitions to gain professional experience. In addition to enabling students to gain substantive knowledge and develop their advocacy skills, these activities help students build long-lasting networks, all for their professional benefit.



Programs



Juris Doctor

The Juris Doctor (J.D.) degree is a unique model of graduate legal education designed to meet the needs of Qatar and the Middle East. The J.D. is the first-of-its-kind graduate law degree in the MENA region; courses are taught in English, preparing graduates to work in the international legal market.

A J.D. differs from an undergraduate law degree in that it is specifically designed for individuals who already hold an undergraduate degree, regardless of the field of study, including law. The J.D. curriculum is tailored to meet students at their current academic and professional level, ensuring accessibility for those from diverse educational backgrounds. The varied experiences of our J.D. cohorts create a dynamic and enriching peer learning environment that is greater than the sum of its parts. Our student body includes individuals from a wide range of professions, such as medical doctors, engineers, architects, healthcare professionals, teachers, and recent graduates, all contributing to a vibrant and multidisciplinary community.

The College of Law's J.D. curriculum is consistent with the best curricula offered internationally. The J.D. was created through strategic partnership with Northwestern University Pritzker School of Law. The J.D. equips graduates with a high level of legal knowledge and complementary research, writing, and advocacy skills. The focus on skills training enables our graduates to make the most of a wide range of career options in the public sector, private corporations, law firms, international organizations, and academia.





Programs

The American Bar Association, the governing body of US lawyers, has passed the following resolution about the J.D. degree: "Whereas, the acquisition of a Doctor of Jurisprudence degree requires from 84 to 90 semester hours of post baccalaureate study and the Doctor of Philosophy degree usually requires 60 semester hours of post baccalaureate study along with the writing of a dissertation, the two degrees shall be considered as equivalent degrees for educational employment purposes." J.D. graduates are also well-positioned to undertake further legal studies in the United States and other countries in Europe. Recent J.D. graduates have pursued or are pursuing LL.M. degrees at Duke University School of Law, Georgetown University Law Center, Harvard Law School, New York University School of Law, and The Graduate Institute, Geneva.

So far, two have become licensed to practice law in Qatar, three J.D. graduates have become licensed to practice law in New York after completing the LL.M. degree at a US law school, one graduate is now an Ontario Licensed Lawyer and another graduate who pursued licensing in the New South Wales Bar is now practicing in Australia.

In short, our J.D. graduates rise to the top as they have combined previous university education and training with three years of rigorous, interdisciplinary legal education.

Graduates of this program will be equipped to:

- ▶ Exhibit comprehensive knowledge of the common, civil, and Shari'a legal traditions and how they apply to the practice of law within public, international, and private sectors.
- ▶ Demonstrate comprehensive knowledge of substantive and procedural issues of certain domestic systems and the international system.
- ▶ Make use of legal doctrine to conduct comparative analysis of multiple systems and formulate reasoned analysis of contemporary legal issues.
- ▶ Test research abilities to shape new policy in a comparative and international legal context.
- ▶ Demonstrate effective communication skills and superior knowledge of professional responsibility issues and decisively identify the appropriate course of action in a given situation.

Program Focus

The first year and a half (Part I) of the program focuses on the foundations for lawyering, while the second year and a half (Part II) applies and elaborates on the legal principles from Part I to major sectors that are vital to Qatar and the region.

The courses in Part I, foundations for lawyering, develop the student's understanding of legal doctrine in key subjects. They also develop analytical and reasoning skills so that the student can articulate the relevant principles and apply them to real-world problems. Taught from a comparative perspective, the courses in Part I examine the different legal systems that converge in global legal practice with a focus on identifying common themes and points of departure. Part I also trains students on how to navigate from one system to another, depending on the exigencies of the transnational transactions they will be required to manage during their professional careers.

During Part II, students apply and further develop their foundational skills in sectors that are vital to Qatar and the region. These areas include energy, healthcare, global economic law and governance,

construction & infrastructure development, media, and sports.

Accompanying the dynamic curriculum is a robust array of co-curricular activities designed to enhance the student learning experience. These include regular talks by leading experts, who provide valuable insights into contemporary legal issues. Additionally, student moot court competitions offer a vital platform for developing advocacy and analytical skills. In these competitions, students argue simulated cases before courts or arbitral tribunals, honing their legal expertise in a practical context. The College of Law has proudly fielded teams in prestigious international competitions, such as the Philip C. Jessup International Law Moot Court Competition, the Willem C. Vis International Commercial Arbitration Moot, and the Europa Competition. Demonstrating its commitment to excellence, the college hosted its first international moot in 2019, the Cybersecurity Moot Competition, which welcomed ten teams from around the world. Notably, the college achieved significant victories in recent years, winning the Dubai International Financial Centre's Digital Economy Moot in 2022 and the Space Law Moot in 2024.

LL.M. in International Economic and Business Law

The LL.M. in International Economic and Business Law is a one-year program designed for recent or established university graduates in law. It is ideal for lawyers working or aspiring to work in international business, private practice, academia, government, and the judiciary.

The world's major commercial hubs, including Doha, rely on individuals equipped with legal and business tools to sustain and grow international trade and investment. Critical to this reliance is a culture based on the law. Understanding relevant legal principles, and how they apply to a myriad of existing and new situations, is key to the success of anyone working in this dynamic area.

The program examines a wide range of issues relating to international business and does so in an innovative, comparative manner, enabling students to develop analytical and problem-solving skills while gaining substantive knowledge.

Program Focus

- ▶ The program provides students with a comprehensive knowledge of critical substantive areas relevant to the role of the lawyer in a global

context. This focus is fitting given HBKU's location in Qatar – one of the world's most prosperous economies with vibrant and fast-growing business, energy, financial, construction, aviation, maritime, media, sports, healthcare, and tourism sectors.

- ▶ Students gain expertise relevant to the structure of international business transactions, entrepreneurship, e-commerce, financing, risk management, international trade law, international investment law, international banking and finance, intellectual property law, international environmental law, and the resolution of disputes in these and other areas.
- ▶ **Graduates of this program will be able to:**
 - ▶ Apply advanced knowledge and methodological skills to undertake research in the field of international economic and business law.



- ▶ Develop research and innovative solutions to complex international business and economic law issues.
- ▶ Analyze the social and policy impact of international economic and business law.
- ▶ Communicate themes and ideas in the fields of international economic and business law effectively.
- ▶ Demonstrate the ability to integrate professional legal ethics into the practice of international economic and business law.

Curriculum

Coursework is divided into mandatory core courses and electives. The program consists of 32 credits, including 26 credits for core courses and six credits for a thesis that must be completed within 12 months, and no more than 18 months, after course commencement.

The curriculum comprises foundational courses such as Contract Law, Research Methods in Law, and Global Legal Ethics and Entrepreneurship Law, which address principles needed to practice law in multiple convergent legal systems.

The curriculum also includes courses and seminars in transnational law, with modules on infrastructure development, international arbitration, global economic law and governance, energy law, commercial law, advanced dispute resolution, and others. These innovative courses are comparative and built on common law, civil law, and Shari'a traditions.

The thesis is the cornerstone of the LL.M. program. Students, in consultation with a faculty advisor, write a thesis on a policy sector of their choice with the aim of analyzing the current legal framework, putting forward reasons for reform by using the skills developed in the methodological courses, and making a policy proposal for legislative or regulatory reform.

Other integral features of the LL.M. program are professional skills training sessions, internships, and placements that focus on such skills as contract drafting, trial advocacy, alternative dispute resolution, and effective negotiation and presentation techniques.

LL.M. in International Law and Foreign Affairs

The LL.M. in International Law and Foreign Affairs is a one-year program that offers world-class academic and professional training in international law and foreign policy decision-making on pressing global challenges facing today's world. Owing to its unique position in terms of culture, business, and geopolitics, Qatar is at the heart of a region that requires leaders who can manage multifaceted relationships that span different legal systems.

The specialized LL.M. program is ideal for lawyers and certain non-lawyers who wish to immerse themselves in the intricacies of international regulation in the fields of sustainable development, energy and environment, infrastructure development, healthcare, human rights, new technologies, anti-corruption, and the global economy, as well as the resolution of disputes in these and related areas.

Program Focus

- ▶ The program provides an ideal learning opportunity for lawyers, academics, members of the judiciary, and non-lawyers in the fields of international relations, political science, economics, and other fields related to global affairs and governance.
- ▶ Courses combine legal studies with public policy analysis relevant to all aspects of international relations.

▶ Graduates of this program will be equipped to:

- ▶ Apply advanced knowledge and methodological skills to undertake research in the field of public international law and foreign affairs.
- ▶ Develop research and innovative solutions to complex international legal and foreign affairs issues.
- ▶ Analyze the social and policy impact of international law.
- ▶ Communicate themes and ideas in the fields of public international law and foreign affairs.
- ▶ Demonstrate the ability to integrate professional legal ethics in the practice of international law and foreign affairs.



Curriculum

Coursework is divided into mandatory core courses and electives. The program consists of 32 credits, including 26 credits for core courses and six credits for a thesis that must be completed within 12 months, and no more than 18 months, after course commencement.

The LL.M. curriculum comprises foundational courses, such as International Law, Administrative Law, Research Methods in Law, Advanced Human Rights, and Introduction to International Law and Foreign Affairs, and Global Legal Ethics, which unpack the nature of international law and core principles of foreign policy decision-making in an increasingly turbulent world. They also provide the opportunity for students to reflect on the intricacies of diplomatic work, including the qualities and skills required for a career in international affairs in the 21st century.

The curriculum also includes intensive courses and seminars on international law and global governance that are comparative and built on common law, civil law, and Shari'a traditions. The thesis is the cornerstone of the LL.M. program. In consultation with a faculty advisor, students write a thesis on a policy sector of their choice with the aim of analyzing the current legal framework, putting forward reasons for reform by using the skills developed in the methodological courses and making a policy proposal for legislative or regulatory reform.

Other integral features of the LL.M. program are professional skills training sessions, internships and placements that focus on such skills as contract drafting, trial advocacy, alternative dispute resolution, and effective negotiation and presentation techniques.

Doctor of Juridical Science (S.J.D.)

The Doctor of Juridical Science (S.J.D.) is the College of Law's most advanced degree. The program is one of the first research-intensive doctorate degrees in the MENA region and one of the few of its kind outside the United States. Dedicated to scholarship and teaching, the program aspires to create a vibrant community of legal scholars, who will assume teaching positions in universities and government positions at institutions in Qatar, the MENA region, and beyond.

The S.J.D. degree is designed to facilitate the relationship with the "real world" through world class innovative seminars and courses that will prepare students to apply legal knowledge in multiple convergent legal systems. Research production in the S.J.D. program, as well as its interdisciplinary nature, allows for creative and problem-based approaches that can have societal or policy impact.

The key strengths of the S.J.D. program are its flexibility to accommodate students wishing to conduct interdisciplinary research in a variety of areas, its focus on high-quality academic research, and the integration of the program with all other existing College of Law degree programs.

Program Focus

- ▶ The program focuses on research methodology and legal ethics in a globalized world.
- ▶ The S.J.D. degree provides students the freedom to apply highly analytical, interdisciplinary, and comparative research approaches that address important and relevant issues of the day.
- ▶ **Graduates of this program will be equipped to:**
 - ▶ Master theoretical and methodological aspects of law and legal scholarship.
 - ▶ Demonstrate the ability to independently conduct original research and formulate reasoned arguments on their topic and related legal issues.
 - ▶ Develop a dissertation of publishable quality that makes a substantial and original contribution to legal scholarship.
 - ▶ Demonstrate effective communication skills, as well as the ability to teach and explain the law.

- ▶ Demonstrate the ability to independently choose ethical courses of action in legal research and practice.

Curriculum

The S.J.D. should be completed in 3.5 years after commencement. In the first year, candidates have a reduced course load to enable them to develop the necessary skills and competencies to undertake doctoral research. Candidates are required to take a course on Advanced Research Methods in Law and a course on Advanced Global Legal Ethics. They may also be required to take additional research methods courses.

S.J.D. candidates participate in the S.J.D. Colloquium, which provides them with fundamental knowledge of the practical and professional aspects of doctoral studies. In addition to receiving

feedback on their doctoral research, students engage in meaningful and constructive scholarly exchanges about publishing, grant writing, and conference presentations, as well as career paths in academia and private, public, and international spheres.

Dissertation

Students are required to complete a dissertation that makes a substantial and original contribution to legal scholarship. Publication of S.J.D. candidates' work is a requirement for graduation.

Residence

The minimum residence requirement for the S.J.D. program is four semesters of full-time supervised research at the College of Law.



Admissions



Admission Requirements

J.D.

Bachelor's degree from a recognized university with a minimum 3.0 GPA (out of 4).

LL.M. in International Economic and Business Law

Bachelor of Laws (LLB) degree or Juris Doctor (J.D.) degree from a recognized university with a minimum 3.0 GPA (out of 4), with a preference given to candidates with at least a 3.3 GPA (out of 4).

LL.M. in International Law and Foreign Affairs

Bachelor's degree from a recognized university with a minimum 3.0 GPA (out of 4) in any of the following areas: Law, International Relations, Political Science, History, Economics, Business and Finance, Sociology or Anthropology. A strong preference is given to candidates with at least a 3.3 GPA (out of 4) in Law, International Relations, Political Science, or Economics.

S.J.D.

J.D. or LL.M. degree, preferably from HBKU's College of Law. Exceptional candidates from other universities may also be considered. Candidates with an LL.B. degree from a recognized university require the LL.M. degree, preferably from the College of Law, or in exceptional cases from a recognized university. Candidates should have at least a 3.0 GPA (out of 4) in their previous law degree with a strong preference for candidates with a 3.3 GPA (out of 4).

English Language Requirements

Unless exempt, all applicants for any degree program are required to submit a valid IELTS score of 6.5 or TOEFL score of 79. Please visit admissions.hbku.edu.qa for more details on the language proficiency requirement and the process to seek exemption, when applicable.



Application Requirements

Academic transcripts

Official electronic copies of transcripts should be submitted as part of the online application. Final transcripts and graduation statements are required for all previous university studies. All transcripts submitted should include an explanation of the grading system. For those who have not completed their current studies, transcripts must include results from the last completed semester of coursework. Transcripts in languages other than English or Arabic must be accompanied with an official translation. Applicants who are admitted to the program based on copies of or incomplete transcripts will be required to provide original transcripts upon enrollment in order to register for courses.

Standardized test results

Official copies (where required) must be sent directly to HBKU. Please refer to the institutional codes below:

- ▶ IELTS: No code required. Students should ask the IELTS center where they tested to send the IELTS TRF to Hamad Bin Khalifa University

Applicants should also submit copies of their test scores with the online application.

Letters of recommendation

Applicants should submit two letters of recommendation, one of which must be from an academic referee.

Personal statement of interest

The personal statement should introduce the applicant to the Admissions Committee. Topics that may be discussed include personal or professional goals and personal, academic, or career history.

The Committee looks beyond test scores and grade point averages in making selection decisions. The personal statement gives the Committee a means to consider a variety of factors in assessing applicants.

Research Proposal

Along with their application, LL.M. and S.J.D. applicants are required to submit a research proposal (1,000 words) that illustrates their readiness to explore a particular research question.

Resume/Curriculum vitae

Applicants are required to submit a copy of their current resume or curriculum vitae as part of the online application.

Identification document

Applicants are required to submit an electronic copy of their passport as part of the online application. Nationals and residents of Qatar should also submit their valid Qatari ID.

Tuition and Student Funding

The College of Law provides a limited number of tuition waivers on a competitive basis.
